



Our program enriches the lives of Littles through workshops that teach them life skills like budgeting, goal setting, healthy nutrition, and basic car maintenance. The Truist Foundation is helping to set our Littles up for big futures!



Our Club Summit program got Littles outside! This fall we spent a day rafting down the French Broad River. In April, we enjoyed a beautiful hike in the Great Smoky Mountains (and saw three waterfalls!). Earlier in the year, we zipped down the sledding slopes at Cataloochee Ski Area, Ski Sapphire Valley, and Black Bear Snow Tubing in Hendersonville.



BBBSWNC staff went to the Qualla Boundary this summer to immerse ourselves in the heritage of the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians. At The Museum of the Cherokee Indian, we learned about generational trauma that still exists because of the removal of the Cherokee and other tribes from their native lands. Our experience was intregal to our partnership with Cherokee Central Schools and our High School Bigs program there. Exposure to culture, beliefs, and traditions enables staff to better support and nurture Bigs and Littles.

Go Back Big!

Students and caregivers faced many barriers to education over the past two years, so we kicked off this school year with "Go Back Big." We reconnected schools we've served for decades with our programs and provided information and treats for teachers. We challenged Bigs to encourage Littles to do their best, because literacy, reading comprehension, and academic success are vital to their futures - and to our mission.
